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Lake Winnipesaukee Association and Town of Meredith team up to protect Lake Waukewan

The Lake Winnipesaukee Association and the Town of Meredith teamed up to install stormwater improvement practices at the Waukewan bathhouse site on Waukewan Street, across from the town beach on Lake Waukewan.

With the help of volunteers and the Meredith Parks and Recreation Department, a rain garden was installed on August 10th, 2017 beside the parking lot area. The rain garden is the final practice installed to reduce the amount of stormwater runoff and pollutants that empty into Lake Waukewan from this site. Last fall the Meredith Department of Public Works excavated the area for the rain garden, constructed the side slopes, installed piping, and connected the rain garden underdrain to a new deep sump catch basin. Stone and geotextile fabric were laid down to protect the excavated area from sediment buildup until the rain garden could be planted this summer. The rain garden acts as a bio-retention basin, collecting and filtering stormwater runoff from the parking lot. An underdrain beneath the rain garden then directs the treated water to the catch basin.

The Waukewan bathhouse site is one of more than 60 sites identified in the updated Waukewan and Winona Watershed Restoration plan completed in September 2016 as contributing sediment and other pollutants to the lake.
