RE: SB 428 *relative to notifications to the rivers coordinator of state agency actions affecting rivers.*

Dear Chair Smith and Members of the Committee:

The Rivers Management Advisory Committee (RMAC) appreciates the opportunity to comment on Senate Bill 428 which proposes to exclude utility providers from the requirements to obtain a signature from a local river management advisory committee (LAC) on the notification form for utility maintenance projects in wetlands located in designated river corridors. We ask the committee to recommend that this bill be voted Inexpedient to Legislate, as the issue is being addressed in rule.

The RMAC does not object to the concept of this bill, but understands that the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) is assembling a rule amendment package for Env-Wt 100 and 300 which will achieve the result sought by the utility industry to eliminate the requirement for LAC sign off on utility maintenance statutory permits-by-notification. This rule change will also eliminate the need for LAC sign-off for many other types of minimum-impact projects, including seasonal dock permits-by-notification and many other dock, beach, deck, forestry, and utility activities that qualify for lower scrutiny approvals. This will eliminate potential permitting delays resulting from the LACs' monthly meeting schedules.

It was only when the final version of the wetlands rules that would go into effect on December 15, 2019, and the accompanying permit application forms, were published that the RMAC understood the process change for LACs with respect to permits for minimum impact activities. In response, the RMAC worked with Rivers Management and Protection Program staff to host a conference call open to all of the 200+ volunteer LAC members to discuss the rule changes and determine the LACs' preferences on handling wetland minimum impact permit applications. Consensus was that LACs did not need to see the permit applications for most of these low impact projects, though they would like to be notified of the approved application. This can be done by NHDES staff without requiring the applicant to obtain a signature from the LAC prior to submitting the application to NHDES.

Should the Resources, Recreation and Development Committee feel that this bill should pass, however, the RMAC requests the following amendment to RSA 483:8 VII:

No state-owned property adjacent to or providing access to a river or river segment shall be recommended for disposal by the council on resources and development or the long range capital planning and utilization committee, whichever is the **first**

point of review deciding body, except upon the review and recommendation of the advisory committee established under this section.”

The RMAC is a legislatively created body charged to work with NHDES to administer RSA 483, the Rivers Management and Protection Program. The Governor and Council appointed Committee is comprised of members from business, agriculture, hydroelectric, municipal government, water supply, conservation, recreation, fish and game, and historical interests. Among its other responsibilities, the RMAC is charged with reviewing legislation relevant to the Program and with advising the NHDES Commissioner on the merits of such legislation.
